National Lottery Awards

As you will probably all know by now, we didn't win the National Lottery competition for best environmental project but lost to the almost unstoppable Bumblebee Conservation Trust. When you realise that they have 7000 paid-up members, it's hardly a surprise that they beat us! However, we did get some excellent coverage on national television on a peak Saturday evening programme, so that was worth the effort in itself. A large amount of that effort was by Volunteers. Several of you gave precious hours to "accost" members of the public as they walked by in the Park or into the Forest Centre, to persuade them to vote for us. And, when the Lottery organisation wanted some film of our work, a dozen or so of you turned out at short notice to

perform for the cameras. On the evening of 4 September the Volunteers were represented on television by Bob Hook, Susan Henderson and Marlies Branston, and Tony and James from the Forest staff and chair of the Trustees Fiona Chapman were also present.





Bedford River Valley Park update

Works to excavate the wet woodland channels near Danish Camp and the back channel off the main river within the Bulge were completed in August after a final push from the contractor RDT Woodland, as the dry conditions were perfect for excavation work but they made for dusty journeys for the three dumper drivers who were removing the spoil. The spoil generated by the excavations will be used by Lafarge in their restoration of the adjacent mineral extraction sites.

Both channels have already been tested with the heavy rain that fell in August, as the wet woodland channels filled and held back water as expected. So come the winter floods the surrounding wooded areas should fill and retain water that help to create a wet woodland habitat. The channel located at the Bulge was designed to recreate a backwater where breeding fish can spawn and shelter from the main river flows and predators. Large shoals of fish can be seen using the channel and the first signs of colonising vegetation are already taking root along the fringes, which will help to shelter the small fry from predators and seasonal flooding and, we hope, increase fish stocks on the river.

A new pedestrian footpath and new bridge will soon be installed around the edge of the Bulge, crossing the new channel, so watch out for further information on the new access.

A volunteer task took place in August involving thinning out and tidying up

wooded compartments as well as installing tree roots within the ponds on the channel to act as refuges for small fry from predators. All weather path for Wetland Trail

The first week of September saw the start of work on a new, hard surface for the two kilometre Wetland Trail in the Millennium Country Park. The all-weather surface will improve access for families with buggies and wheelchairs as well as making the route easier for everyone to use throughout the year; and anyone who has walked the site during a wet winter will know how sticky our clay is.

This exciting project, funded by WREN will allow access to bird hides, feeding stations and great views of different wildlife habitats including reed beds, meadows and young woodland. Eight interpretation boards aimed at families will create a 'Wildlife Safari' packed with information, things to look for and games to play. The pay trail will start from the far side of the Forest Centre Meadow which will be open for people to picnic, fly a kite or kick a ball around. Work is expected to be complete by the end of October.
